CONTEXT

Tunisia is considered among the countries with the most comprehensive social protection system in the MENA region, with its large contributory and non-contributory schemes. Tunisia has historically been a leader in the region in social protection for women, labor protections, and more recently pluralistic democracy. However more than 44% of the working population were still outside the social protection systems in 2019 and there remainentrenched geographic inequalities between the coast and the interior, as well as ill-targetedsocial spending.

Moreover, the health crisis of COVID-19 has exposed the current limitations of the social protection system despite the government deployment since the beginning of the crisis of eight urgent measures (2 contributory and 6 non-contributory) to mitigate the socio-economic and health impacts of the crisis.

With the adoption of the new constitution of 2014 Tunisia had embarked on reforms tobetter extend the coverage of programs especially to categories not yet covered and, more specifically, to active people in the informal economy. The country must also account for thechallenges faced by the social protection system such as the performance and the targeting quality of non-contributory programs, inequality of access to care services, the problem of financial imbalance of funds and the exclusion of some vulnerable categories from the social protection system.

As part of the project "Reimagining Social Protection in Jordan and Tunisia" two national consultations were organized in January and September 2021, and in January 2022, around the social protection system in Tunisia. These events brought together social protection experts, academics and civil society actors to discuss the different schemes and programs, the limitations of this system especially in the face of the health crisis, identify key challenges and suggest practical recommendations.

This conference is intended as an opportunity for dialogue between the various actors of civil society, policy makers, politicians and experts, to disseminate and discuss the policy recommendations and the key messages of six papers on the system of social protection in Tunisia.





OBJECTIVES

The conference will be an opportunity for experts, civil society representatives and policy makers to:

- 1. Exchange on the outputs of the different papers on the current state of social protection system in Tunisia
- 2. Discuss the main challenges of the current social protection system in general andmore specifically regarding health insurance and outcomes, social protection extension strategies for informal workers, minimum and living wages, health insurance, and targeting cash assistance
- 3. Discuss the role of civil society in promoting social protection reforms based ona comparative analysis between Tunisia and Jordan.
- 4. Discuss the main policy recommendations
- 5. Determine the main priorities in terms of reforms for a more inclusive social protection system in Tunisia.

DIALOGUE ORGANIZATION

This conference will center on providing space for various stakeholders to discuss policy implications of research findings. Six thematic sessions will take place in which the policy implications of each paper within this series will be presented and discussed by a panel of experts. Panel discussion will be followed by open discussion:

- Presentation of Policy Findings 15 minutes per paper.
- Discussants 5 minutes.
- Open discussion 10 minutes.
